The History Corner

The Hampton-Pinckney Holiday Walk-About on December 11 will feature four very distinctive and significant homes. As you visit these homes, you will want to pay close attention to

the architectural detailing that makes each home unique. The four homes were built over approximately a forty year time span so several architectural styles are represented. Each of the owners have worked hard to rehabilitate their home and you will love what they have done!

11 Pinckney Street



Built in 1907, this two-story brick house was the home of Avery and Bertha Meader Patton. Mrs. Patton's brother was the well-known New York architect, H. Lee Meader, who designed 11 Pinckney Street. Avery Patton was the owner of Independent Guano Co., a fertilizer manufacturing company. It is presently the home of Ron and Colleen Whitworth and their four children. This is their second home in the Hampton-Pinckney Historic District that they have taken on for rehabilitation.

36 Pinckney Street



Linda Morrison bought the Glover House this past spring and with the help of Rodger's Contracting has done an excellent job of restoring its Craftsman fea-Built around 1914, the Glover family owned 36 tures. and 38 Pinckney Street until the 1970's. 36 Pinckney is

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an excellent example of the Craftsman or Bungalow style with tapered porch pillars on brick piers and a shed dormer on a curved roof. The house has beautiful leaded glass transoms and sidelights.

314 Hampton Avenue



The Landrum House is one of the neighborhood's most historically and architecturally significant It was built around 1874 by Chevis M. homes. Landrum and Melinda Penelope McBee, a granddaughter of Vardry McBee. Melinda, like the other descendants of Vardry McBee (the modern "father" of Greenville), was given acreage by Vardry McBee within the neighborhood which enjoyed close proximity to Prospect Hill, Vardry's home place (now the site of the Greenville Water Systems office). The Landrums constructed an eclectic house with beautiful classical detailing. It features a prominent gable dormer with a distinctive arched window. The front door also features a beautiful fan light and Ionic columns grouped in threes on brick piers with turned balusters. The house is owned by Charlie and Mary Beth Rolfe who have carefully rehabilitated it over the past couple of years.

320 Hampton Avenue

This distinctive two-story Queen Anne residence was built in 1907 by Dr. Gentry. His daughter and son-in-law, Judge and Mrs. Jester then lived in the house the rest of their lives. Like many of the residences in the neighborhood, 320 Hampton Avenue had an apartment in the house during World War II and it was bought in 1980 by David and Beth Novack, the current owners. Its most distinctive feature is the three-quarter wraparound porch with the Tuscan columns and turned balusters. During the walk-about, note the roof gables with their small Palladian windows. –rb
