Central Baptist Church Rezoning

PHC Communities filed an application to rezone Central Baptist Church and the vacant lot fronting Lloyd Street between Hampton Avenue and Pinckney Street. The requested rezoning designation is PD-R, Planned Development Residential (current zoning is R-6, Single Family Residential).

The PD-R designation is a site specific zoning designation based on a site plan submitted by the applicant. The PD-R application can address reduced setback requirements, traffic circulation, landscape

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buffers, and density issues that might not be covered under more general zoning designations. PHC Communities is planning to develop condominiums on the vacant lot and church property. A public hearing is being held at City Council Chambers, Tenth floor of City Hall, on **Tues. The History Corner



For over 125 years, St.
Mary's Catholic Church has been an integral part of the Hampton Pinckney neighborhood. Today, the beautiful campus of St.
Mary's encompasses several blocks bordered by West

Washington Street, Hampton Avenue and part of Butler Avenue (site of the former Datco auto parts building). The campus includes several significant, historic buildings the 1904 Gothic Revival Church sanctuary, the adjacent rectory and St. Mary's School (1930). St. Mary's School was designed by Rev. Michael McInerney of Belmont Abbey, NC and was constructed by Gallivan Building Company at a cost of \$60,000. There are exciting expansion plans for the church which will further enhance the campus and play a key role in the city's new streetscape plan for West Washington Street.

However, the history of St. Mary's and its association with the Hampton Pinckney neighborhood pre-dates its current campus by a considerable span of time. On February 7, 1876, one acre of land on the NW corner of Hampton Avenue (then Highland Street) and Lloyd Street was conveyed by Vardry McBee to the Greenville Catholic Mission for \$10. The small Catholic congregation of 70 members in Greenville received its first resident priest in 1868 and had been previously served by visiting priests. \$1,500 was raised from the congregation and an additional \$2,000 contributed by local Protestants for the construction of a small, wooden frame church. On October 15, 1876, the church of "Our Lady of the Sacred Heart" was dedicated. The church remained at this location until 1885 when 1.16 acres on West Washington Street was deeded to the church and the frame church was moved intact (via logs) to the new site. Shortly thereafter, a small rectory was built adjacent

to the new location of the church. The original frame church continued to serve St. Mary's for many years. With completion of the Gothic Revival church in November, 1904, the original frame church was relocated to the rear of the new church and it became the parish hall for St. Mary's. By 1900, the Ursuline Sisters of Greenville had established a school in a rented house on Academy Street from Mrs. Earle and one other rented house. The school grew quickly with "57 day pupils, one boarder, two lady boarders and four music students." Additional land was acquired in 1901 on Hampton Avenue to expand the school and shortly the first school building was erected. By 1920, the school had 120 students and a faculty of 9 sisters. In 1933, seven members of The Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy moved to Greenville from Charleston to operate and staff the school. St. Mary's Catholic Church and the parochial school continued to grow over the coming decades with several subsequent expansions. It provides an anchor for the neighborhood and tirelessly serves the community with a growing, thriving parish. Thank you to Bill Biediger of St. Mary's for research information and photograph. - rb
